An electronic device capable of viewing and interacting with websites and web forms, such as a laptop or tablet (a cell phone might work, but it is discouraged). The student will need to have this device available during every class session and for homework between classes.

DESCRIPTION

This course considers the compositional vocabulary and construction of music from the common practice period of music history. It includes content on modulation, basic counterpoint, secondary dominants, borrowed chords, Neapolitan 6 chords, augmented 6th chords, and the contemporary use of church modes.

COURSE ORGANIZATION

- Every two weeks a new topic will be introduced and presented in class
- The student will have worksheets related to the material to complete in class as well as for homework
- During each week the student will have an opportunity to demonstrate his/her comprehension of the material on an exam

Students arriving late to an exam is an unnecessary disruption to the testing process. Therefore, the Final Exam will begin promptly at 8:00 and the classroom doors will be locked at that time. Any student arriving after that point will not be allowed to take the Final Exam and will receive the grade of 0 (zero). The students are strongly encouraged to arrive early to the exam and not run the risk of jeopardizing their semester grade.

GRADING

Class Participation	- 10% of the semester grade
Weekly Quizzes	- 50% of the semester grade
Final Exam	- 40% of the semester grade

Class attendance and appropriate interaction with the instructor and classmates is expected. A student who is frequently absent or not engaged in the classroom discussion or activities will run the risk of having a 10% reduction in his/her semester grade. (Come to class. Pay attention. Be engaged.)

The textbook includes worksheets that the student will be expected to complete. Since the textbook is in PDF format, the student will either need to print the worksheets and complete them on paper with a pencil, or have a way to complete them on his/her electronic device. Most of the weekly quiz material will come from these worksheets.

Each of the weekly quizzes will be given during the class session. The quiz will begin promptly at the beginning of the class period. The quiz will be projected onto the screen in the classroom and the student will submit his/her answers through an online form linked on the course website. No paper quizzes will be available. (Don't forget your laptop or tablet!)
