DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course considers the compositional vocabulary, musical structure, and analytical techniques from the late 19th century through the 20th century. Emphasis will be given to the various movements of the 20th century, along with the compositional styles and techniques of the significant composers associated with those movements.

- The first part of each week will consist of classroom instruction, exam review, homework review, and class discussion
- At the end of each week the student will have an opportunity to demonstrate his/her comprehension of the material on an exam
